
- * Collections (approximately)= 17 million items?





*Edit-a-thons

An outreach event that brings together professionals from GLAM institution, Wikipedians, and members of the public to improve and generate content

- * Small group (up to ~20 people)
- * Topical focus
- * Specific goals

Introduces community members to each other, combines communities

Focuses attention on a particular topic

* Gets well covered, forms the base for further activities

Encourages women to contribute, helps improve Wikipedia's bias

Themes can include:

- * Geographically-based themes
- * Topics connected to institutions
- * Activist edit-a-thons
- * Topics around national events

Who are you inviting to participate in this event?

- * Will there be GLAM staff or members of the public who may not be experienced Wikipedia editors?
- * Invite Wikipedians from your local Wikimedia chapter to help out first-time users

What will the aims be?

- * Improve existing articles
- * Start new articles
- * Complete new articles
- * Add digital content

Plan the hook for the day and let this lead your publicity

'Wiki Takes' your city

* one-day wiki scavenger hunt and/or free content photography contest conducted in a particular locale

Themes or goals can include:

- * A specific location or locations
- * Stopping points of interest in a particular cultural institution
- * Features or happenings according to a theme found in various places throughout a city
- *Themes such as transportation, education and ecology
- * Mix and match

Expose the general public to contributing to free content in a unique way

- * No special technical knowledge is required
- * Majority of the participants are not Wikimedia contributors, but they are consumers of content
- * Encourage them toward taking a more active role in the websites they use daily



*Backstage Pass

An event coordinated through a single cultural institution that brings local Wikipedians behind the scenes

- * Seen as an act of good faith by the GLAM organization to the Wikimedia movement
- * Often results in shared resources, such as images or hard to find research sources, being contributed to Wikimedia
- * Often an edit-a-thon is incorporated as part of a Backstage Pass event

Aim:

- * Successfully bring Wikipedians and curators together to tour behind the scenes
- * Work with organisation's experts to improve a number of articles on items in their collections

Treasures or special items can be brought out by experts and/or participants can be brought behind the scenes to see projects on the go

Advantages for the host organisation:

- *Outreach to a local interest group
- * Access to expertise on a significant feeder-website to their institution
- * Improved awareness of themselves through improved WP content
- * Increased re-use of their content and expertise

Advantages for Wikimedia:

- * Improved free-culture content about this area
- * Personal learning/interest
- *Gaining 1-on-1 access to expertise
- * Access to normally restricted areas
- * Showing 'human face' of Wikipedia


