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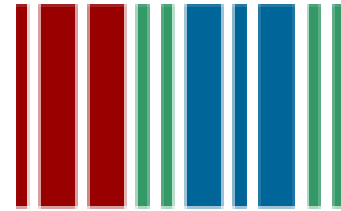
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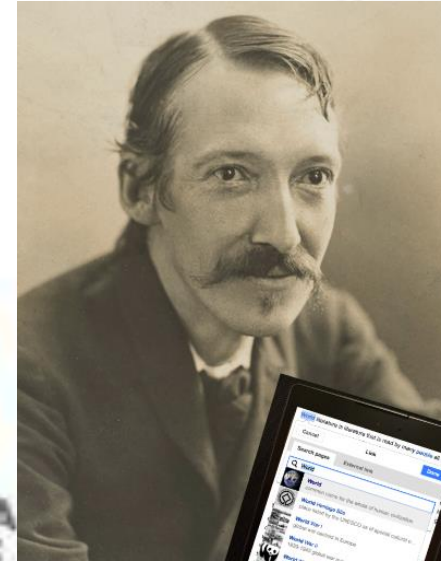

Robert Louis Balfour Stevenson (13 November 1850 – 3 December 1894) was a Scottish novelist, poet, essayist, and [travel writer](#). His most famous works are *Treasure Island*, *Kidnapped*, *Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde* and *A Child's Garden of Verses*.

A literary celebrity during his lifetime, Stevenson now ranks among the 26 most translated authors in the world.^[1] His works have been admired by many other writers, including Jorge Luis Borges, Bertolt Brecht, Marcel Proust, Arthur Conan Doyle, Henry James, Cesare Pavese, Ernest Hemingway, Rudyard Kipling, Jack London, Vladimir Nabokov,^[2] J. M. Barrie,^[3] and G. K. Chesterton, who said of him that he "seemed to pick the right word up on the point of his pen, like a man playing spillikins."^[4]

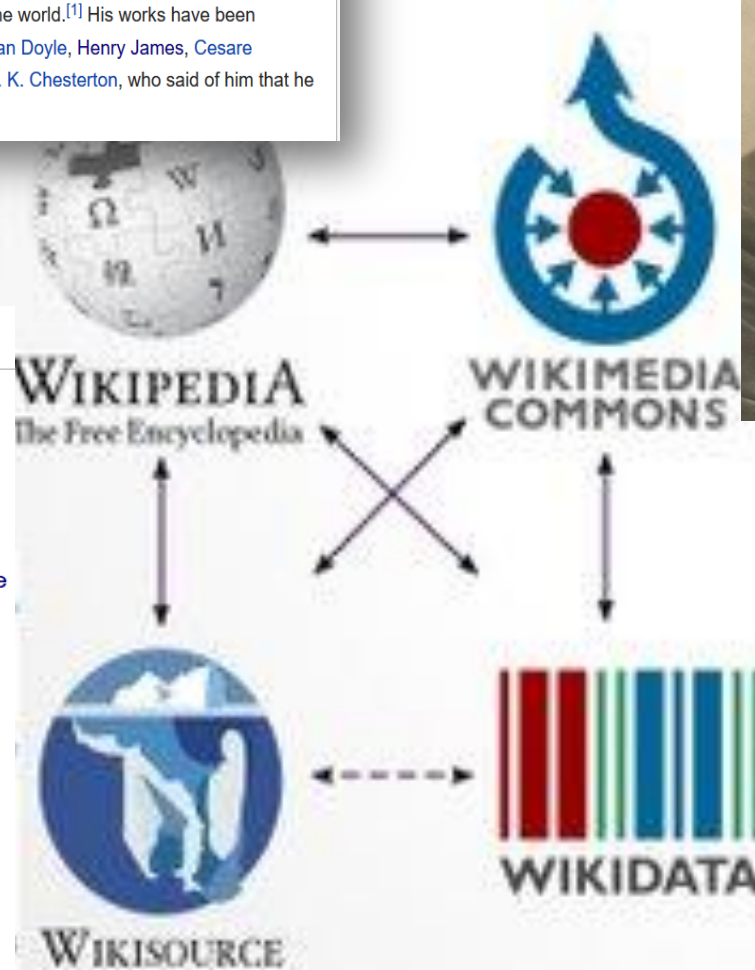

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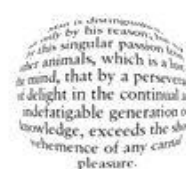

The **poodle** is a group of formal dog breeds, the **Standard Poodle**, **Miniature Poodle** and **Toy Poodle**. The *Fédération Cynologique Internationale* (FCI) recognizes four sizes of one breed: standard, medium, miniature, and toy. Poodles exist in many coat colors. The origins of the poodles are still discussed. Most of the literature like the FCI states that the poodle descends from the old French **Barbet** breed, others state that the breed might come from Germany as a type of **water dog**. The breed was standardized in France.

Ranked second most intelligent dog breed just behind the **Border Collie**,^[2] the poodle is skillful in many **dog sports** and activities, including agility, obedience, tracking to herding, circus performers or **assistance dogs**. Poodles have taken top honors in many **conformation shows**, including "Best in Show" at the **Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show** in 1991 and 2002, and at the **World Dog Show** in 2007 and 2010.

Toy Poodles won "Best in Show" at Crufts in 1966 and 1982. Standard Poodles achieved the award in 1955, 1985, 2002 and 2014. The 2002 winner came from Norway and was the first overseas exhibit to win the Crufts best in show award.^{[3][4][5]}

History

The origin of the poodle is disputed. *Encyclopædia Britannica* traces the origin of the poodle in Germany^[6] where it was known as the *Pudelhund*. The word *Pudel* is derived from the Low German verb meaning "to splash about", and the word *Hund* (dog). The *Fédération Cynologique Internationale* holds that the poodles descends from the French dog **Barbet** and might have been crossed with the **Hungarian water dog**. The breed was standardized in France, where it was commonly used as a water **retriever**.^[7] The French name **Caniche** comes from the word *cane* (the female of the duck) since this type of breed was used as a water retriever mainly for duck hunting thanks to its swimming ability.^[8] Due to the breed's popularity in France, it became established as its national breed.^[6]

The European mainland had known the poodle long before it was brought to England. Drawings by German artist **Albrecht Dürer** established the popular image of the breed in the 15th and 16th centuries. It was the principal pet dog of the late 18th century in Spain, as shown by the paintings of the Spanish artist **Francisco Goya**. France had toy poodles as pampered favorites during the reign of Louis XVI at about the same period.^[9]

The poodle has contributed to many other dog breeds, such as the **Miniature Schnauzer**,^[10] **Standard Schnauzer**,^[11] and dogs of the **Bichon** type^[12] in order to either save those breeds from **extinction**, reduce size, or by **dog fanciers** to improve their appearance.

The storm's aftermath in [West Palm Beach](#)

The **1928 Okeechobee hurricane** was the second deadliest tropical cyclone ever in the States, after the [1900 Galveston hurricane](#). The only major hurricane of its season, it struck [Guadeloupe](#) as a [Category 4](#) storm on September 12, causing 1,200 deaths. The islands of [Martinique](#), [Montserrat](#), and [Nevis](#) also reported damage and fatalities. After sustained winds peaked at 160 mph (260 km/h) the next day, the storm became the only Category 5 hurricane to hit [Puerto Rico](#); 24,728 homes were destroyed and 192,444 were damaged, leaving 1,000 dead and over 500,000 homeless. Early on September 17, the storm made landfall in [Florida](#) at [Lake Okeechobee](#) with winds of 145 mph (233 km/h). The storm surge forced water over the southern edge of the lake, spreading floodwaters as high as 20 feet (6.1 m) over hundreds of square miles. Houses were swept away in the cities of [Belle Glade](#), [Canal Point](#), [Chosen](#), [Pahokee](#), and [South Bay](#), and at least 2,500 people were killed. The tropical storm also hit [Georgia](#) and the [Carolinas](#). Overall, the system caused \$100 million in damage and at least 4,079 deaths. ([Full article...](#))

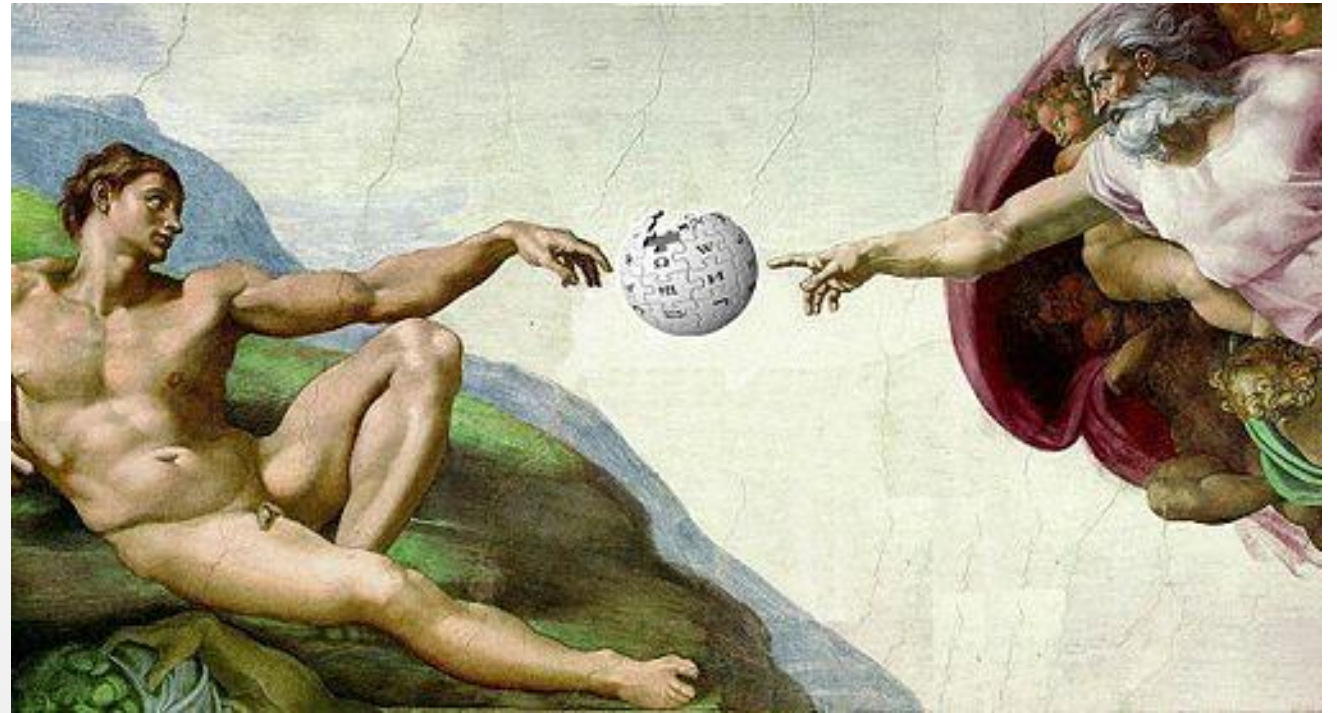

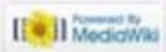
